Hymn: 783 Abide with Me

A Lamb Goes Uncomplaining Forth

Text by Paul Gerhardt

About the Author: Paul Gerhardt is one of Germany's greatest hymnwriters. His life was marked with several crosses that helped him to better understand the grace of God. At an early age, his father, Christian, died, while the Thirty Years' War raged throughout Germany. In 1655 Gerhard married Anna Maria Berthold. Their first daughter died in infancy, and the family suffered from extreme poverty. While serving as Pastor in Berlin Gerhardt was forbidden to preach in his own church for not being willing to abandon Lutheran doctrine. While this battle was raging, Gerhardt and his wife had five more children, but three of them did not live past their first few days. After he left Berlin, another son died, and his wife became seriously ill. By Easter 1668 she died. Gerhard's only surviving family was a six year old son. In 1669 Gerhardt was Called to serve as Pastor in Lübben, where he remained until his death.

In total Gerhardt wrote 133 hymns (21 in *TLH*; 21 in *Christian Worship 21*; 18 in *CW93*). However, while several other composers from his era see declining translation into English and inclusion into hymnals, Gerhardt's hymns are actually seeing a resurgence, and new Lutheran hymnals are translating and including more of his hymns, especially ones that were unknown.

About the Hymn: Gerhardt penned "A Lamb Goes Uncomplaining Forth" for Good Friday 1648. Originally this hymn had ten stanzas. The translation in *The Lutheran Hymnal* is made up of stanzas 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, and 10. *Christian Worship* has stanzas 1, 2, 3, and 6. Stanza 10 from the original is *Lord, When Your Glory I Shall See* (#884) in CW21.

A Lamb Goes Uncomplaining Forth has been called masterpiece of all Passion hymns because it brings together all the themes of Christ's crucifixion. The tune is associated to the hymn but was actually written 23 years earlier for a paraphrase of Psalm 137.
